Course Objectives

1. To provide knowledge of:
 - Organs, cells and molecules that make up the immune system of domestic livestock species
 - innate and adaptive mechanisms of protection against the wide variety of pathogens that threaten animal health,
 - current strategies to manipulate immune systems of livestock species (i.e., vaccines).
2. To conceptualize theories and processes relating to immune dysfunction and immunization.
3. To develop theoretical and critical thinking skills such as development of hypotheses regarding immune mechanisms and development of solutions to infectious diseases of livestock and application of concepts to management of livestock.
